Core path  
The core path from Harrietfield to Amulree will be maintained.

Location of deer fence to protect vulnerable conifer species still in consideration

Watercourses will be protected with riparian buffer zones to protect and enhance water quality

Archaeology and scheduled monuments will be protected and buffered

Priority habitats such as deep peats will be protected and enhanced.

Existing woodland will be managed in line with the UK forestry standard.

Existing sporting infrastructure to be maintained and developed

Buffers will be created around residential areas to maintain views

Woodland creation  
The potential woodland creation area is shown in green and will contain a variety of species under different woodland creation grant models contributing to meeting the Scottish Government's targets for woodland creation.  
The majority of the scheme will be under the conifer model incorporating productive species, broadleaf and designed open ground. The scheme will also include native broadleaf, diverse conifer models and native scots pine models.

“.....please can I reassure members of your community that we will not be surrounding Harrietfield or the public road frontage with walls of trees. Not only would this be inconsiderate of community opinions captured at the recent stakeholder meetings, but would not comply with the UK Forest Standard.....

The concept map highlighted in red an area of high landscape prominence which will be reflected in the owner’s objectives and, ultimately, the proposed woodland design. For those that asked at the stakeholder meetings at Kindrumpark, we explained that there was an option to plant a “community woodland” in proximity to the village, but that sufficient space would be retained to keep any plantings back from the houses..... Moreover, the fields below Kindrumpark and along the public road will lend themselves to grazing and retention of open space for landscape views.

May I also reiterate the woodland design process, whereby Tilhill Forestry (on behalf of the Flavell’s) engage with stakeholders to identify any concerns and opinions, consider how these integrate with the owner’s objectives and good woodland design principles, then develop a design to best account for these. I would urge stakeholders to bear with us whilst we conclude the consultation process and then move forwards to draft a good design, which will be approved by the Flavell’s and then shared with stakeholders.

Given the prominence of the site and the strength of feeling, we will undertake to host a specific site meeting to review and discuss our proposals once they are ready. Jamie will update the concept map based on my comments above – but please note that this is not the planting area.
